The tour commences and concludes at the Mercure Brighton Seafront Hotel.



Transport

If you are travelling by car:

Take the M23 towards Brighton and continue onto A23. At the roundabout, take the 3rd exit onto Mill road. At the roundabout, take the 1st exit onto Dyke Road Avenue, and then turn right onto Woodruff Avenue. Turn left onto Shirley Drive and continue onto The Drive/B2185. Continue to follow the B2185 and turn left onto Kingsway A259 and your destination with be on the left.

If you are travelling by train: The nearest train station is Brighton –1.5 miles away



Mercure Brighton Seafront

With incredible seafront views, the 4-star Mercure Brighton Seafront Hotel is the ideal place to stay when visiting this historic city. The Grade II listed hotel is a grand Victorian landmark with period features, including stuccoes Regency frontage, original mirrors, chandeliers and a high-ceilinged ballroom for celebrations. The hotel features a bar and restaurant. The comfortable bedrooms all offer flat screen TV, free Wi-fi, hairdryer, telephone and tea and coffee making facilities.

Parking is available on-site on a first-come, first-served basis at a cost of £18 per night.

Check-in and departure from the hotel

Rottingdean

Rottingdean is a village in the city of Brighton and Hove, in East Sussex, on the south coast of England. It borders the villages of Saltdean, Ovingdean and Woodingdean, and has a historic centre, often the subject of picture postcards. The Kipling Gardens in Rottingdean are named after the village's most famous resident, 'Jungle Book' writer Rudyard Kipling, these delightful gardens are full of rustic village charm. Surrounded by flint walls and sitting close to Rottingdean's village green and duck pond, Kipling Gardens is a great example of a traditional English garden. In close walking distance from the gardens are local shops and cafés. The nearby 12th Century church St Margaret's is famous for its Burne Jones windows. St Margaret's Church is an Anglican church in Rottingdean, in the English city of Brighton and Hove. Rottingdean became part of the former Borough of Brighton in 1928. Parts of the structure date from the 13th century, and it is a Grade II* listed building.

Designed by Philip Webb, the house is one of the finest examples of Arts and Crafts workmanship, with Morris & Co. interiors creating a warm and welcoming atmosphere. The house is dressed for a weekend stay in 1925, so you can imagine you are a guest of the family.

Ditchling Museum of Art and Craft

It might be surprising that a village the size of Ditchling warrants a museum dedicated to the art and craft created by local artists. But Ditchling is no ordinary village. Throughout the 20th century it attracted artists and craft workers of national repute. This museum provides the opportunity to see the works in the place where they were made. When Eric Gill arrived in 1907, he was not the first artist in the village, but the Catholic guild of artists and craft workers he co-founded with Hilary Pepler, Desmond Chute and Joseph Cribb was the magnet for many who followed subsequently. Two miles north of the village on Ditchling Common, the Guild of St Joseph and St Dominic built homes, a chapel, and workshops for silversmiths, stone carvers, carpenters, printers and weavers. The Guild ran from 1920 to 1989. In the village other important artists worked including Edward Johnston, Rowland Emett, Ethel Mairet, Frank Brangwyn and Charles Knight, while distinguished illustrators Raymond Briggs and John Vernon Lord work in the village now. http://www.ditchlingmuseumartcraft.org.uk/


