Transport



If you are travelling by car:

From central London – Take the M1 out of central London towards Northampton. Exit at A45 (junction 15). Follow this road (London Road) to Eagle Drive in Northampton.

If you are travelling by train: The nearest rail station is Northampton which is 12 min from the Hotel.

Check-in and departure from the hotel

(i) Places Visited

Wrest Park

A 19th century house following the style of an 18th century French chateau, with magnificent 18th century gardens. The house was used as a hospital during the First World War in August 1914. Wrest was used first as a convalescent home before being transformed into a base hospital that November.

Now you can explore the evolution of the English garden with a stroll through three centuries of landscape design at Wrest Park. From dazzling parternes and fragrant borders, to sweeping views and woodland walks. Wrest Park is a real treat for the senses. Visit some of the 92 acres of award winning gardens, gold winner of Anglia in Bloom Awards 2017.

The Higgins Art Gallery & Museum

The Cecil Higgins Museum, as it was formerly known opened its doors to the public in July 1949, housed in the former Higgins family home. The museum was founded by philanthropic brewer, Cecil Higgins (1856-1941) to house his collection of ceramics, glass objets d'art for the benefit, interest and education of the inhabitants of, and visitors to, Bedford.

78 Derngate was famously re-modelled by Charles Rennie Mackintosh in 1916 for his client, Northampton model engineer, W.J Bassett-Lowke. Purchased for Bassett-Lowke by his father as a wedding present, the house had originally been constructed 100 yrs previously.

Stoneywell

Stoneywell is the realisation of one man's Arts and Crafts vision within a family home. Original furniture and family treasures fill the cottage's quirky rooms and, outside, every turn conjures childhood memories of holiday excitement - one way to the fort, another to the woods beyond. Designed as a summer house by architect, craftsman and designer Ernest Gimson for his brother Sydney, the cottage at Stoneywell is a model of Arts and Crafts ideals. More recently lived in full-time by the grandson of its first owner, the cottage is furnished with many original pieces made by Ernest and his circle of craftsmen. https://www.nationaltrust.org.uk/stoneywell

Ashby St Ledger, St Leodegarius

A 14th/15th century building with very good furnishings. 15th century Rood Screen and pews,17th century three decker pulpit, 18th century box pews. The stained glass dates from the mid-19th century and is Ward & Nixon & J.Powell & sons. Only a fragment of the 14th and 15th century glass remains in the north and south aisles. The wall paintings discovered in 1929 date from the 14th to the early 16th century. Fine monuments including those to the Catesby family and later to the Ashleys attributed to Hedges and John Bacon.

(i) Your Guide

Prof. Anne Anderson is a recognised authority on the Arts & Crafts movement and is Hon Research Fellow, Exeter University and the Huntington. A writer and broadcaster Anne was a senior lecturer on the Fine Arts Valuation degree courses at Southampton Solent University specialising in the Aesthetic Movement, Arts and Crafts and Art Nouveau. She is a NADFAS lecturer and some of her academic papers have appeared in the Journal of the William Morris Society, Journal of the Pre-Raphaelite Society and many others. Her recent projects include reconstructing the original



interiors of Lord Leighton's studio-home and her television credits include BBC's Flog It!

Dr Scott Anderson is a Senior Lecturer in the History of Art and Design, who was a professional archaeologist for ten years before his interests shifted to the world of art, antiques and auctioneering. In 1994 he joined the team at Southampton Institute (now Southampton Solent University) as a Lecturer in Fine Arts Valuation, the only BA (Hons) degree course of its kind to look at the commercial art world. He also has a particular interest in architecture and in recent years has taught courses on the history and theory of interior design, and art and design history. Now, as a Senior Lecturer, he concentrates on teaching, research and publication. Scott has written extensively, in learned journals and popular magazines, on both ancient and 19th-century ceramics, Roman archaeology, and Victorian and Edwardian art and design. He is an Honorary Fellow of the National Association of Valuers and television credits include BBC's Flog It!
