Transport

• If you are travelling by car:

Leave the M4 at junction 4B and follow the M25 South towards M3/M23/M20/Heathrow/Gatwick Airport. Merge onto the M25 and continue forwards, leave at junction 12, and merge onto the M3 towards Southampton. Exit the M3 at junction 6, Basingstoke A339. At the roundabout, take the 2nd exit onto A339. Keep left at the fork, follow signs for A30. Continue on Ringway S/A30 towards Basingstoke. At Black Dam Roundabout, take the 1st exit onto Ringway S/A30. Take the exit towards Black Dam/Eastrop. Turn left, then turn right onto Old Common Road. Turn left and your destination will be on the left.

If you are travelling by train:

The nearest train station is Basingstoke – 2 miles away.

Check-in and departure from the hotel

St Nicholas Church, Steventon

The church of St Nicholas lies nearly half a mile from the centre of Steventon village. The Rectory where Jane Austen was born and spent her first 25 years was pulled down by her brother Edward in favour of a grander house on an eminence overlooking the village.

The church dates from the twelfth century and remains a small simple building despite some restoration in Victorian times which included the addition of stained glass windows and a steeple on the tower. Memorials to the Austen family, some of whom were Rectors of Steventon, can be seen in the church and the churchyard.

Chawton House

Chawton House is over four hundred years old. It was built by the Knight family in the 1580s following the acquisition of the estate by Nicholas Knight in 1578. There was already a manor house on the estate prior to this, first recorded in 1224. The house's most famous association is with Jane Austen, whose brother Edward, inherited the house when distant family members Thomas and Catherine Knight, made him their heir. Edward offered the bailiff's residence, five minutes' walk from Chawton House, to his mother and sisters, Jane and Cassandra, and it was there, now the Jane Austen's House Museum, where Jane enjoyed the most prolific period of her writing life.

Chawton House Museum

Jane Austen's House Museum in Chawton, Hampshire, is the house where Jane Austen lived and wrote. It is the most treasured Austen site in the world. It was here that Jane's genius flourished and where she wrote, revised and had published all her major works: Sense and Sensibility, Pride and Prejudice, Mansfield Park, Emma, Northanger Abbey and Persuasion.

'Rummaging Through the Reticule'




