

Transport

<u>Travelling by car</u>: Nearest motorway is M5. Exit at Junction 27 for hotel. Distance from nearest junction is 7 miles.

<u>Travelling by train</u>: The nearest rail station is Tiverton Parkway which is 7 miles from the hotel.

Check In and departure from hotel

Cothay Manor Gardens.

One of Somerset's finest historic houses, Cothay is surrounded by acres of romantic gardens that are open to the public. Said to be the finest example of a small medieval manor in England, Cothay dates back to the 14th century, and has been lovingly restored with period furniture and fabrics by current owners.

Twelve acres of magical gardens surround the manor. Many garden rooms, each a garden in itself, are set off a 200 yard yew walk. In addition, fine trees, cottage garden, courtyards, and a river walk; a plantsman's paradise. The gardens have achieved the highest accolade of two stars in the Good Garden Guide and in June 2012 featured in the Daily Telegraph's '20 Best Gardens in Britain'.

RHS Rosemoor

Surrounded by over 100 acres of woodland with the River Torridge running along the western border, Rosemoor features some stunning gardens including a rose garden with some 2,000 rose plants, an arboretum, herb, fruit and vegetable gardens and an alpine house. A variety of clematis introduced as part of the RHS Bicentenary Plant Collection is named after the garden.

The garden was first opened to the public in 1967, under the National Gardens Scheme. A small nursery was started in 1979. Both the garden and nursery were noted for rare and unusual plants. By the 1980s, the garden was attracting significant numbers of visitors.

In 1988 Lady Palmer gave the garden to the RHS, together with an additional 32 acres (13 ha) of land. In the mid 1990s 37.5 hectares (0.375 km²) of woodland surrounding the site, mainly coniferous forest, was added to the garden, securing the land bordering the garden from unwanted change, providing opportunities to blend the garden into its surrounding landscape and also providing it with a range of additional experiences for visitors.

Christopher Bailes, curator of Rosemoor Garden, described the garden in 2008 thus: "Tucked into the north-east corner of the estate, it remains very much a plantswoman's garden, dominated by surrounding woodlands, with a number of discrete areas where choice subjects take full advantage of the warmth and shelter offered by the south-westerly aspect and high ground to the north."

Today Rosemoor Garden covers 65 acres and it includes a visitor centre, a library, a plant centre, a shop, a restaurant and the Wisteria tearoom. In 2017 the garden received 231,060 visitors. https://www.rhs.org.uk/gardens/rosemoor

Marwood Hill

This magical and very special 20 acre private garden with three lakes is set in a valley tucked away in North Devon only 4 miles from Barnstaple. Created by Dr Jimmy Smart VMH in the late 1950's the gardens are a wonderful haven in which to relax and enjoy the impressive collections of plants, shrubs and trees and experience the views and peaceful atmosphere. The garden has featured on many garden programmes over the years and is enjoyed by visitors of all ages looking for inspiration, relaxation or just a great day out. Arlington Court

The Arlington estate belonged to the Chichester family for eleven generations. The house and carriage museum are home to over 5000 artefacts from tiny model ships in bottles to grand state carriages. The house as we now see it was built in three phases: the first was the neo-classical block designed by Thomas Lee and built for Colonel John Chichester in the 1820s. It was designed to replace an earlier house, which was sited by the church. That house was a Tudor building which had been updated in the 1790s but which developed structural problems. The decision was made to site the new house further down the hill and to develop the garden and views around it. Colonel Chichester did not have the pleasure of living in his new house, he died in 1823 just as the building works were completed.

David is a popular figure in the horticultural world, well liked and respected for his knowledge by nurserymen, professional gardeners, journalists and the gardening public. He has designed, built and planted show gardens and display stands at most of the major garden shows in the UK, including the world-famous Chelsea Flower Show, and is now a Designate Judge for the Royal Horticultural Society.

He has also travelled to every continent, with the exception of Antarctica, to discover plants and gardens, both independently and on more than 50 trips accompanying groups of gardeners.


