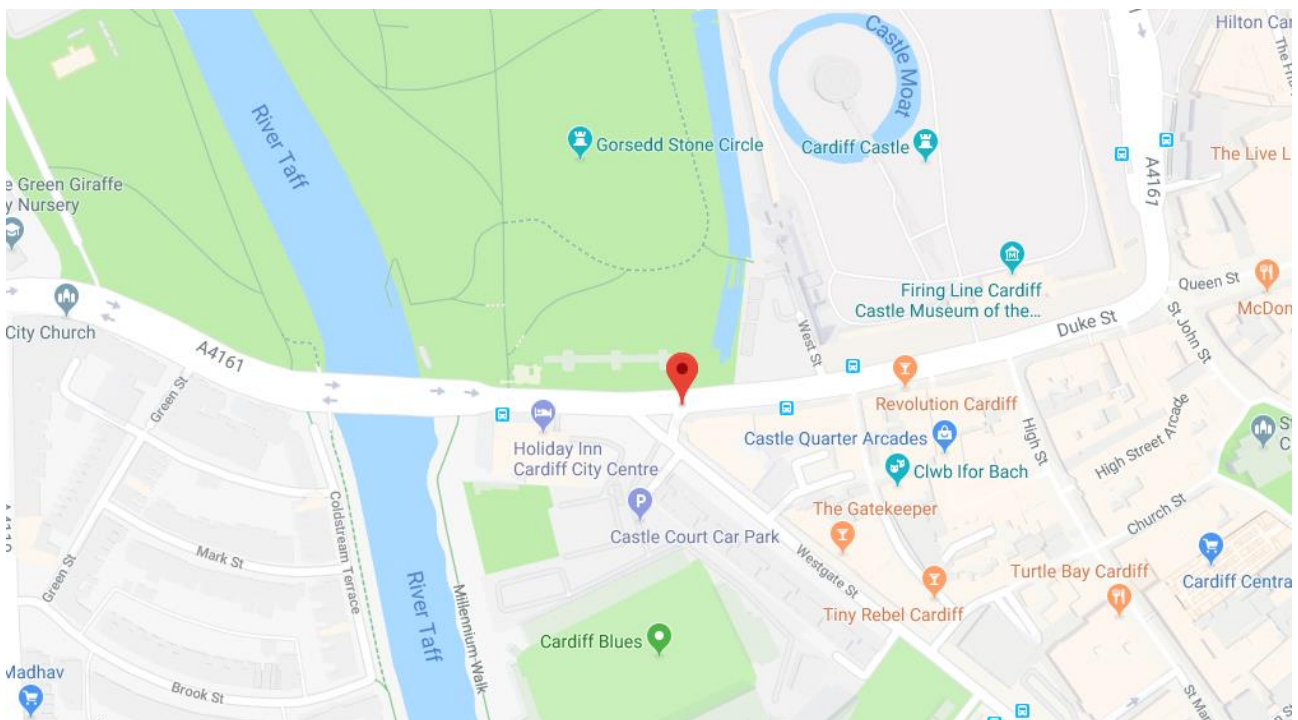

Transport

Travelling by car:

From the North - Take A 470 following signs for CARDIFF and then CITY CENTRE. When in the city centre, Cardiff Castle will be on your right. The hotel is on the left after the castle.

From the East - Exit junction 29 of M4 motorway onto the A48, follow signs for CITY CENTRE. Turn onto A470 heading into city centre. When in the city Cardiff Castle will be on your right. The hotel is on the left after the castle.

From the West - Exit junction 33 of M4, onto B4232. Take 2nd exit and head to CITY CENTRE. Pass Cardiff City Stadium on your right, through traffic lights and under rail bridge. At next set of lights turn right into Wellington St and Cowbridge Rd and then into Castle Street. Hotel on right as you cross the bridge.

Travelling by train: Cardiff Train Station is approx. 5 minute taxi ride.



Accommodation

Holiday Inn, Cardiff

Located in the city centre of Cardiff, this modern and accessible hotel offers comfortable bedrooms with private bath/shower, TV, telephone and tea/coffee making facilities. Facilities at the hotel include a restaurant & bar.

Car parking is available at the hotel, at a cost of £10 per night, payable directly to the hotel.

Check-in and departure from the hotel

Places Visited

Caerwent

Founded in AD 75 by the Romans, Caerwent was a market town for the defeated Silures tribe. Large sections of the Roman town walls are still in place, rising up to 5 metres high in places. Historian John Newman has described the walls as 'easily the most impressive town defence to survive from Roman Britain', and in its freedom from later rebuilding one of the most perfectly preserved in Northern Europe. The name Caerwent translates from Welsh as 'fort of Gwent' and the name Gwent derives from the Roman name Venta.

Romano Celtic temple

The remains of a Roman City can be seen at Caerwent. The 44-acre site was surrounded by a high wall much of which still survives. Known to the Romans as Venta Silurum, the city becomes the tribal capital of the Silures.

Caerleon

A Roman legionary fortress and settlement, the remains of which lie beneath parts of the present-day village of Caerleon, on the northern outskirts of the city of Newport. Many people were unaware of this Roman military base, and only since the early 1900's have the secrets of the Roman fortress of Isca been slowly rescued from oblivion. Prior to this, visitors to the ruins had mistakenly confused the remains of the Britain's biggest Roman Amphitheatre with King Arthur's Round Table! The National Roman Legion Museum at Caerleon researches, preserves and displays half a million objects from the Roman fortresses of Caerleon (Isca), Usk (Burrium) and their environs. It is an internationally important collection which provides evidence for life in two major Roman military bases, as well as life in civilian settlements that grew up around them.

Cardiff Castle

One of Wales' leading heritage attractions and a site of international significance, Cardiff Castle is set within beautiful parklands located in the heart of the city. Cardiff Castle's walls and fairytale towers conceal 2,000 years of history. The original motte and bailey castle was built in the late 11th century by Norman invaders on top of a 3rd-century Roman fort. Commissioned by either William the Conqueror or Robert Fitzhamon, the castle formed the heart of the medieval town of Cardiff.

Raglan Castle

A late medieval castle located just north of the village of Raglan, this modern castle dates from between the 15th and early 17th centuries, when the successive ruling families of the Herberts and the Somersets created a luxurious, fortified castle, complete with hexagonal tower, known as the Great Tower or the Yellow Tower of Gwent.

Tintern Abbey

The Cistercian abbey of Tintern is one of the greatest monastic ruins of Wales. Founded in May 1131, by Walter de Clare, Lord of Chepstow, in the reign of Henry I, it soon prospered, thanks to endowments of land in Gwent and Gloucestershire, and buildings were added and updated in every century until its dissolution in 1536.

Chepstow Castle

A Norman castle perched high above the banks of the river Wye, Chepstow castle is beautifully preserved and is a history lesson in stone. Dating back to 1067, this castle was used in the conquest of Gwent during the 12th century. From the time it was built through to 1690, the castle, almost chameleon-like, changed its appearance as fashions changed in military architecture. More a case of bright architects than bright colours however.
