




The tour starts and finishes at Best Western Plus Connaught Hotel, Bournemouth.

Transport

Travelling by car:

From M27, continue onto the A36, then take A338 towards Bournemouth/Christchurch/Bournemouth International Airport. Keep left at the fork and follow signs to Christchurch/B3073 and merge onto A338. At the roundabout, take the 2nd exit onto Wessex Way/A338. At Bournemouth West Roundabout, take the 1st exit onto Cambridge Road/B3066, at St Michael's Roundabout, take the 1st exit onto Poole Road and turn right onto West Hill Road and your destination will be on the right. Please note, car parking at the hotel is on a first come, first served basis. See notes under the Hotel information on the next page.

Travelling by rail:

The nearest train station is Bournemouth Railway Station, 1 mile away.

Accommodation

Best Western Plus Connaught Hotel, Bournemouth

The Connaught Hotel and Spa Bournemouth has 81 luxury rooms, split between the main hotel and the adjacent Connaught Lodge. This hotel in Bournemouth West Cliff is just minutes from the stunning sandy beaches the town is famed for and is only a five-minute walk to Bournemouth town centre. The facilities include brasserie restaurant and gin bar, fully equipped gym, indoor swimming pool and spa. Each of the well-appointed bedrooms feature modern en-suite facilities with complimentary toiletries, hair dryer, TV, safe, tea and coffee making facilities and free wi-fi.

Car parking is available at the hotel. Please note, car parking is free at the hotel on a first come, first served basis. Please note that those clients staying on the 2-night tour basis will need to move their cars from the hotel car park on the last day of the tour before visits for that day commence. We recommend West Hill Public Car Park which is located only 5 minutes' walk away from the hotel costing £10 for 24 hours parking.'

Check-in and departure from the hotel

Check in is from 15.00. The tour will start in the evening when the tour manager Dr Scott Anderson will meet you in the Franklyn Suite at 18.30 for the welcome reception, along with our expert guide Prof Anne Anderson.

On the last day of the tour, the tour will not finish until approximately 17.30 so you should check with your tour manager, or the hotel reception, where luggage should be stored until your departure.

For those bringing their own car, please take note of the car parking restrictions as mentioned above under the Hotel information.

Extra nights

If you have booked to stay an extra night at the hotel, this is on a bed and breakfast basis and check out from the hotel is at 11.00.

(i) Places Visited

Russell Cotes Museum

East Cliff Hall was the home of Merton (1835-1921) and Annie Russell-Cotes (1835-1920). The building of East Cliff Hall was begun in 1897 and was completed in its first form in 1901. The house was designed by the architect, John Frederick Fogerty, but Merton and Annie had a great deal of input into the design. It was designed so that they could live in style and comfort and to house their growing collections. The house was to be a showcase, not simply for their own enjoyment, but also for the people of Bournemouth to whom it was given. On 15 July 1901, Merton presented East Cliff Hall to his wife as a gift on her 66th birthday. This was the same year that Queen Victoria died, making the house one of the last Victorian buildings ever built. http://russellcotes.com/

Southampton City Art Gallery

Opened in 1939 and housed in a beautiful and period, custom-designed building, Southampton City Art Gallery holds one of the finest collections of art in the south of England. Currently comprising over 5,000 works and spanning eight centuries, the collection is an outstanding educational resource that can trace the history of European art from the Renaissance to the present. Notable works include Allegretto di Nuzio's 'Coronation of the Virgin', Guiseppe Arcimboldo's 'Summer', J. M. W. Turner's 'Fishermen upon a Lee Shore in Squally Weather', Claude Monet's 'The Church at Vétheuil', Edward Burne-Jones's 'The Perseus Series', Walter Sickert's 'The Juvenile Lead', Paul Delvaux's 'A Siren in Full Moonlight' and Chris Ofili's 'Two Doo Voodoo'.

Compton Acres

Poole Museum

Set in a Victorian quayside warehouse, with an atrium extension dating from 2007, the Museum's galleries tell the story of the historic maritime town of Poole and its Harbour from prehistory to the 21st century. Poole Museum is housed in four closely connected but very different buildings. You enter through the new atrium building, designed by architects Horden Cherry Lee, and completed in 2007. You then walk through into Oakley's Mill, a Victorian grain warehouse and flour mill with floors supported by heavy beams and posts. The medieval Ship Inn used to occupy this site and, from that building, there are a remarkable set of carved timbers – two of which are displayed on the First Floor. The third building is the Town Cellars. Originally built about 1300, it has impressive stone walls and a magnificent timber roof. Across Salisbury Street is the fourth building, Scaplen's Court, Poole's most complete medieval domestic building. The herb and physic garden is open throughout the summer and Scaplen's Court can be visited during August.

(i) Your Guide

Your guide, **Professor Anne Anderson**, author, broadcaster and Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries, was a senior lecturer at Southampton Solent University for 14 years, specialising in the Arts and Crafts, Art Nouveau and Modernism. OPractical Information


